#### Position of the course

This basic course helps students become familiar with the most important genres, authors and texts from ancient literature, and teaches them how to situate these within the socio-political, historical and literary context. At the end of the course, students will have read characteristic samples of Greek and Latin literary texts in translation.

#### Contents

A survey of the development of the most important literary genres is given, situated within the historical, socio-political and literary context. Besides theoretical insights and factual knowledge, texts which students have read in translation will be discussed.

As an addition to the courses, students are given a reading package with Greek and Latin texts in translation.

- 1 To be able to situate the classical literary canon within its tradition.
- 2 To be able to relate the classical literary canon to socio-cultural facts.
- 3 To have knowledge of the importance of classical literature to the later European

literary history.

4 To have a chronological framework for the further study of ancient literature.
