Position of the course

The relationship between citizens and government is multifaceted and has recently been put under pressure. Due to amongst others a low level of trust, the representative democracy is in crisis. Both governments and ordinary citizens have therefore taken initiatives to involve citizens more and more directly in the policy making process. The goal of this course is to elucidate the relationship between citizen and government and to understand, to interpret and to see through negative and positive consequences of the instruments and mechanisms developed to improve this relationship. On the basis of the participation ladder, these processes are subsequently treated, both the rather classic instruments initiated by the government and more new forms of involvement often originated from citizens themselves. Apart from this, the course also pays attention to the relationship between members and elite in organizations and political parties
