Position of the course

In this introductory course, students are familiarised with various aspects from both the history of the German-speaking countries and the 'Landeskunde' and culture of the German-speaking countries.

Contents

In the History part, all periods (from the early Middle Ages until the present day) are dealt with in chronological order. More attention relatively is paid to the history of the 19th and 20th centuries than to the preceding centuries, because this ties in better with the contents of the study programme.

The Culture part first discusses various aspects of the German-speaking countries (Landeskunde). The emphasis is on the geography and population, political system, media etc. of Germany, but the other German-speaking countries are also covered (including East Belgium). Next, a range of culture-related topics are covered in greater depth, including cultural heritage, cultural history and present-day culture.

For each weekly lecture students may be set a preparatory reading task that forms part of the mandatory subject content for the examination.

Initial competences

general historical, geographical, political and cultural knowledge from secondary education.

Final competences

- 1 To demonstrate insight into important historical, political and cultural aspects of the German-speaking countries.
- 2 To demonstrate knowledge of the culture of the German-speaking countries in the wider sense, including e.g. cultural history and aspects of civic culture.
- 3 To demonstrate an overview of the outlines (and possibly constants) of the history of the German-speaking countries.
- 4 To apply the above-named knowledge and insights in the interpretation of topical developments in the German-speaking countries.
