Position of the course

This advanced course imparts knowledge of the details of classic Sanskrit grammar and syntax. The course teaches the students to analyze and translate Sanskrit texts of elementary to intermediary difficulty. The students learn to use dictionaries and linguistic works.

This course meets the following learning outcomes: 1.1, 1.2, 1.3, 1.4, 3.1, 3.2, 3.3, 3.4, 5.1, 5.2, 5.6

Contents

Interactive reading of selections from texts of elementary to intermediary difficulty, such as Nalopakhyaṇa and Kathasaritsāgara with special attention for the cultural and religious context.

Initial competences

Having followed the courses of Sanskrit I and II with success or having acquired the competences envisaged therein in a different way.

Final competences

- 1 To be able to use dictionaries and other linguistic works independently and systematically.
- 2 Being able to situate Sanskrit texts in their cultural and religious context
- 3 Acquire good knowledge of Sanskrit grammar and syntax and apply this knowledge to translate and analyse Sanskrit texts of elementary to intermediary difficulty

The students prepare the texts at home. These preparations are grammatically and syntactically analyzed and discussed in class. The students and the teacher work together to find a poetic Dutch translation. The teacher discusses the cultural and religious context.

Extra information on the examination methods

Written exam: translation of an unseen part of a Sanskrit text.
Oral exam: translation and analysis of fragments of the texts studied in class.

Calculation of the examination mark

Written exam: 50 % of the marks. Oral exam: 50 % of the marks.
Students who do not take part in the assessment of one or more parts of the course evaluation or obtain a mark of less than 10/20 for one of its parts cannot pass the course evaluation. Should the average mark be higher than 10/20, the final mark will be reduced to the highest non-pass mark (= 9).
