Position of the course

This course gives the students a survey of the history of the Eastern Roman Empire from Diocletian to the fall of Constantinople in 1453, and it complements the courses 'History of Classical Antiquity' and 'History of the Middle Ages'.

Contents

The students will learn the main outlines of the history of Byzantium and acquire the necessary framework of structures, names, and concepts needed to understand the most important evolutions in Byzantine history. The course is divided in three modules: early Byzantine period (c. 250 - 600, Dr. Alison John), middle Byzantine period (c. 600 - 1070, Dr. John Latham Sprinkle), late Byzantine period (c. 1070-1453, Dr. Jeroen Wijnendaele).

Initial competences

General knowledge of the history of Classical Antiquity and the Middle Ages
Good command of the English language

Final competences

- 1 To have a firm knowledge of the most important historical facts and interpretations
- 2 To be able to explain the main concepts, structures, changes, and historiographical problems, and to situate them on a long term perspective.
- 3 To show familiarity with the sources of Byzantine history and to be able to recognise, discuss, and critically evaluate them.
